Brenda Arnold - CQG #060, 061

Brenda is the quintessential quilt top producer. At a trunk show in April 2025, she showed over 30 "flimsies" waiting to be quilted. Each was of a different pattern and for each she shared the pattern source or online access details. Her vast source of free patterns makes her a perfect convenor of the "Worker Bee Wednesday" (#048) group, a job that she took over in 2021. One fun and quick pattern/technique she introduced for community quilts and donated fabric is the 'three yard quilt' - a design of Donna Robertson and her daughter Fran Morgan of Fabric Cafe.¹ These tops are made with only three coordinating yards of fabric and the site boast more than 70 free designs that sew up quickly and look inviting.

Brenda joined the guild in 2017, essentially to meet local quilters. She had recently returned to Cranbrook after 40 years away. She really started quilting in 1994 when she wanted a "stress reliever". Prior to that, in 1981 (age 22) when she wanted a hobby she took a course at the college in Lethbridge. She knew of quilt-making of course as her grandmother was a quilter. Her quilts were utility in style, made from old clothes and even fortrel. It took Brenda a few years to become 'addicted', but she now says "Quilting is my life; I do it everyday." Brenda's first quilt was a sampler - "it's still not completed". The block patches were cut with scissors using hand-drawn templates, and one of the fabrics was 'eyelet'.

Brenda loves any "star block" and has a fondness for 'purple'. She has completed 20+ quilts. She has 75-100 quilt tops made. She loves to bring patterns together and piece the tops; she's not so keen on doing the machine quilting. Like most quilters, her pieces are for home use, gifts and charity, and she does make small lap quilts, table-runners, bags, placemats and the like. She uses most of her basement for quilting and has a very extensive collection of books and fabric. Her fabric stash has its origins in quilt shops in Brooks, Medicine Hat, Lethbridge, the Cranbrook shops, and "Joann's" in the Kalispell area plus a useful online site: *Connecting Threads*. She recalls Joann's wall of fabrics and loading a grocery cart! Brenda is drawn to the bright colours of Kaffe Fassett and batiks. Pre-washing fabrics is no longer on her agenda. With the crazy prices now, she is paying "some" attention to the cost.

Brenda sews on a *Pfaff Tiptronic* or *Ambition* - both cost her about \$1,000. If she machine quilts a piece, the pattern is usually stitch-in-the-ditch done on one of her domestic machines. Most finished quilts have been quilted by a longarmer - Barkley's mother in Three Hills and Brenda Augustine locally for a cost around \$200/quilt.

Living in the Brooks/Tilley area of Alberta where she taught school, Brenda set-up the Brooks *Prairie Patches Quilt Guild.* And she offered the students quilting as an elective/optional course - the project was a "rag quilt" - a style that has exposed raw edge seams on the front and often made of flannel or 'old blue jeans' with the seams clipped at intervals to encourage fraying when washed. Brenda also offered a beginner course to adults, and a bargello quilt class.

Since joining the Cranbrook guild, she took care of the Membership List from 2017 to 2021 and was a piecer with the *Worker Bee Wednesday* group before becoming the coordinator. For the guild's two in-house auctions, Brenda has been the capable banker - about \$1,000 changes hands in a few hours! In 2023 she was one of the organizers of the guild's "I QUILT" exhibit at the local *1401 Gallery* (articulatemag.ca). Here art piece - "I QUILT" - was chosen as the exhibit's signature. Since September 2024, she has helped with the guilt documentation part

of the guild's History Project. Brenda is 'interested' in machine quilting on a mid-arm and meets with a small group of members with frame set-ups, "The Long-Armers".
