Judy Beaulac (# 084) was instrumental in accepting this project on behalf of the area guilds. Judy with Derryll White, the curator of Fort Steele Heritage Town and Noel Ranch, the Fort's display coordinator, came up with the idea of making quilts with the intent of adding "the trappings of civility" to the *North West Mounted Police* (NWMP) officers' quarters. An article¹ in the Kootenay Advertiser details that after two years of research and restoration it was only these trappings that were missing from the new exhibit, specifically "Superintendent Samuel Steele and his colleagues needed quilts for their beds". Five area quilt guilds participated: Cranbrook, Fernie, Kimberley, Moyie and Creston. Each guild was assigned an officer and asked to use vintage designs and fabric reproductions of the 1880s for the quilt.

CQG#001 - Oak and Reel

Quiltmaker: Cranbrook Quilters Guild Owner: Fort Steele Heritage Town #999.43

The Cranbrook Guild's planning committee was Judy Beaulac, Judy Wright (#043) and Peggy McGowan. The project was close to Peggy's heart because her great-grandfather was an early member of the NWMP and probably knew Sam Steele. In total 19 members (see quilt label #001) worked on the quilt - nine made the appliqué blocks and swag borders, and the others joined in the hand-quilting, which was done in the basement at Judy Wright's home. Peggy McGowan collected the appliquéd blocks and set and sashed them. When the hand-quilting was done, Peggy added the binding. The quilt was appliquéd, pieced, and hand-quilted in about 9 weeks - quilting was two mornings a week starting in March and it was off the frame on May 11, 1999. Three of the quilts were featured at the Cranbrook Guild's quilt show in June before being presented to Fort Steele later that month.

The oak and leaf pattern<sup>2</sup> was chosen for Superintendent Steele because it was a "masculine design - indeed the oak leaf symbolizes strength, dignity, and longevity." The guild felt that it was highly likely that "a group of quilters could have made such a quilt for Superintendent Samuel Steele, who was a bachelor to the time."

This quilt was made by members of the Fernie Guild specifically for the quarters of Inspector Zachery Taylor Wood. The pattern and colours was chosen because the Inspector was American born; the simple star motif and red-white-blue colours are symbolic of the American flag and the military, though the five-pointed star on the flag is more common for military insignia.

CQG# 003 - Feathered Star

Quiltmaker: Kimberley Quilters Guild Owner: Fort Steele Heritage Town #999.44

Members of the *Kimberley Quilters Guild (North Star Quilters Society)* made this medallion quilt. Mary Frick, guild member and owner of *Sew Creative Chalet* had previously made a 12 block, sash and block quilt of this pattern. She liked the vintage block and the idea of a whole top design. She thought it was challenging enough to appeal to the guild members. She put out the challenge and 12 quilters committed to helping her create the quilt. Mary drew-up the pattern on graph paper and streamlined the directions. The fabrics are reproduction designs from *RJR Fabrics*, San Pedro, CA. In the mid 1900s, the *Smithsonian Institute* reproduced vintage fabrics to enable contemporary quilters to create versions of historical quilt designs. Later RJR Fabrics collaborated with the Smithsonian to offer a better quality cotton fabric. This is the fabric that Mary bought for this quilt. The quilt was hand-quilted on a large frame that had been made by Mary's husband, Albert.

The quilt was presented at Fort Steele Heritage Town in May1999 by Mary and Albert Frick, Tanis Rye, and June Owen. It was made specifically for Dr Powell's quarters in the North West Mounted Police barracks. The guild surmised that being a doctor, Powell would be from a wealthier family, so his was the most elaborate quilt made by the guilds.

CQG#005 Utility Quilt

The Creston Guild, after researching what style of a quilt would be on a cooks cot, decided to restore a vintage quilt owned by one of its members. It was specifically "for the kitchen area of Kootenay Post; a cozy spot for the cook's cot". The label holds the information about the quilt: This utility quilt was made by Ella Prins, nee Willhelmina in Killaloe, ON in 1936. The quilt was passed down to her eldest daughter Norma Houston, nee Prins, of Creston, BC. Norma donated the quilt to the Creston Valley Quilters who restored the quilt and then presented it to Fort Steele in May 1999.

This was a common style of a home use quilt in the 30s and later - likely made from scraps taken from clothing that would go to the rag-bag or sometimes scraps were purchased from garment making companies to make quilts - men's suits or work clothes.
